

## India's COP8 Delegation should Include Industry Stakeholders, Says TII

With the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC) Conference of Parties (COP8) Meeting being scheduled for October 1-6, 2018 in Geneva, Switzerland, The Tobacco Institute of India (TII) has called upon the Indian Government to undertake prior consultation with farmers and other Industry stakeholders on the FCTC Articles contained in the COP8 Agenda.

In a Press Statement, issued on August 13, 2018, the Institute has also sought inclusion of stakeholder representatives in the official Indian delegation to the FCTC COP8 which will discuss and adopt measures in relation to the FCTC Articles.

“This will ensure that the stakeholder view point on various issues arising out of the Agenda is taken cognizance of and no unilateral and discriminatory one-sided decision is taken by the Parties to the Conference that is inimical to the livelihood of millions dependent on tobacco in India,” TII emphasised.

TII pointed out that contrary to the United Nations doctrines and assertions of the FCTC, the COP processes have become extremely non-inclusive and secretive. “Despite repeated appeals by tobacco growers and farmer organizations over the years from across the world, participation of this vital stakeholder group in the Conference has consistently been denied,” TII noted.

TII said that framing of tobacco control policies at the Conference without the involvement of tobacco farmers, whose livelihood is seriously threatened, is unfair and unprincipled with the risk of their genuine concerns being subverted and severely compromised.

The Institute also apprehended that anti-tobacco activists and NGOs, who attend and participate in COP proceedings, will “seek to influence the decisions on the various Articles of the FCTC at the COP8 meeting through contentions that are not based on scientific evidence, leading to the serious undermining of the interest of tobacco farmers and other industry stakeholders”.

According to TII, any decision arrived at the COP8 unilaterally without taking the views of those that derive their livelihood from tobacco and which is not based on livelihood considerations will have a devastating impact on farm incomes and the lives of millions that are dependent on tobacco.

The Government of India as the President of COP8 should therefore, uphold the high democratic principles of the Indian Constitution and take a leadership position in facilitating the participation of tobacco farmers and other industry stakeholders in policy-making in the proceedings of the FCTC COP8, TII submitted.

Meanwhile, tobacco acreage and production in the country have started declining under the leadership of the government in various states like Andhra Pradesh to shift to alternative crops in a big way, a senior government official

said on Monday. Alternative crops like foodgrains, cereals, pulses, oilseeds, vegetables, sugarcane, oil palm, and even dairy and poultry activities have been identified for tobacco growing areas in different states, he said.

"Both area and production of tobacco are declining every year because the government is supporting with funds to encourage the tobacco growers to shift to alternative crops," the official said.

About 64.5 crore was released to the tobacco-growing states in the 2017-18 fiscal to shift to alternative farming. Funds are being provided under the Sakshigatya Krishi Vikas Yojana (SKSY), he said.

As per the latest data, the tobacco area has declined by 11.56 per cent to 5.94 lakh hectares in 2016-17 from 4.67 lakh hectares in 2014-15. Total tobacco output has come down to 4.85 lakh tonnes in 2016-17 from 5.25 lakh tonnes in 2014-15.

The guidelines for the international tobacco control conference say no person connected to the industry can be nominated for participation

Tobacco Institute of India has appealed to the Government of India to undertake prior consultation with farmers and other industry stakeholders and include stakeholder representatives in the official Indian delegation to the FCTC COP 8.

The WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC) Conference of Parties (COP8) Meeting, presided over by India, is being held in Geneva from the 1<sup>st</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup>, October 2018 to discuss and adopt measures in relation to the Articles of the Convention. FCTC is an international convention that makes it obligatory on signatory countries to take prescribed tobacco control measures.

The request is bound to be rejected as the Guide for Delegates to the Conference of Parties 2018 clearly lays down: "In accordance with Article 5.3 of the WHO FCTC as the Guidelines for implementation of Article 5.3 adopted by COP in 2008, Parties should not nominate any person employed by the tobacco industry or any entity working to further its interests, or any person benefiting from the proceeds of tobacco
